Turtle Education Events

Two turtle education events are scheduled in July and August:

- ✚ Saturday 16th July 10-11am at the Cockburn Wetlands Centre: Get Wild About Wetlands – presentation by Dr Jacqueline Giles.
- ✚ Sunday 21st August 10-3pm at the Canning River Eco Centre: Community Science Fair – turtle activities stall organized by Elaine Lewis.

Jacqueline's presentation will outline the latest scientific understandings about the Oblong Turtle, while Elaine's stall aims to highlight issues impacting on the survival of the Oblong Turtle through various educational activities.

Turtle Education Pack

Elaine commenced the collection of resources for a turtle education pack. The library search continues. CWC, Excelsior Primary School and Friends of the Western Swamp Tortoise contacted Elaine about sharing their education resources. Elaine will continue to liaise with these groups.

Turtle Hotline Poster Promotion

Turtle Hotline posters encouraging community participation are on display at the 3 sites – Herdsman Lake Wildlife Centre (HLWC), Cockburn Wetlands Centre (CWC) & Canning River Eco Education Centre (CREEC). No reports have been received by the Centres yet, which isn't surprising given this is a 'quiet' time of the turtle year.

Partnership with UWA

Elaine is working with third year UWA Science Communication students to develop a communication plan for *Turtle Watch*. On 22nd April, 15th and 26th May meetings were held with three Science Communication students working on the project. Elaine attended the final presentation of the communication plan on Friday 27th May. Recommendations were made. The *Turtle Watch* team will consider the implementation of these recommendations. Sincere thanks to the students for their contribution to the project.
